Decorating for the Christmas Season




On Thursday, December 3, at 9 AM we will be decorating the sanctuary with holiday greens. This is a very important task and involves preparing and placing fresh greens, candles, and other Christmas items throughout the sanctuary. If you can spare an hour or so on Thursday morning, please join us!

The Past and the Future

It's hard to believe that the Advent and Christmas season is upon us again! It comes around every year but somehow it seems to take me by surprise each year!

If you think about it, what we celebrate during Advent and Christmas seem to be in conflict. Advent is about looking to the future, anticipating an event. But the event to which we look forward has *already happened*—the birth of the Messiah! How do we look forward to something that is in the past?



This season we'll be learning more about expectation with eagerness. Israel knew about a savior, but did they really understand what that savior would be like? How would we look forward to something we didn't fully understand? We'll consider some prophecy, some history, and some poetry to help us begin to experience and understand the sense of anticipation the Jews had before Jesus was born. And we'll mark each week by lighting a candle on our journey.

I hope you'll join me as we make these five "stops" along the way towards the arrival of our Savior.

November 29 | "Hope for Salvation" | Isaiah 64:1-9; Psalm 80

December 6 | "Comfort and Peace" | Isaiah 40:1-11; Psalm 85

December 13 | "Good News Brings Joy" | Isaiah 61:1-4, 8-11; Psalm 126

December 20 | "Love is a Gift" | 2 Samuel 7:1-11, 16; Psalm 89

December 24, Christmas Eve | "The Light has Come!" | *Isaiah 9:2-7: Psalm 96*

Wonder and anticipation are not just for children looking forward to receiving gifts—they are for all of us, looking forward to and eagerly awaiting the coming of our Savior. After all, it is those who have a child-like heart who will experience true Christmas!

Revival and Renewal (Psalm 85)

Psalm 85:9 "Surely his salvation is near those who fear him, that his glory may dwell in our land." (NRSV)

Psalm 85 is the lectionary psalm for the second Sunday of Advent this year, December 6th. It is interpreted by many to be a prophetic psalm involving the promise of revival and renewal. This psalm opens with a statement of the blessings conferred on the people in the past (vv. 1-3); followed by pleas for renewal (vv. 4-7); and finally expresses the faith that God will provide for a renewal and the benefits we receive from that (vv. 8-13).

In verses 1-3, the psalmist speaks of God as having been favorable to his people in the past, recalling a time when things seemed encouraging and life more fulfilling. However, verses 4 and 5 indicate that in the recent past as well as current times, things are not as good, and that God seems angry with his people.

The central verse (verse 6) in this psalm, contains the plea; "Will you not revive us again, so that your people may rejoice in you?" This is the central theme of this psalm. The verses that follow depict the benefits of a renewal through the poetic language of the psalmist. When God's people feel renewed, they can more fully rejoice in God's creation.

I encourage you to compare several biblical translations of this psalm, i.e. the New English Bible (NEB), the New Revised Standard Version (NRSV), and the King James Version (KJV). There are specific words that each translation uses, and to me, these words offer a more complete understanding.

For example, in the NSRV the words "Steadfast love" and "Faithfulness" are used instead of "Mercy" and "Truth" as found in the KJV. Compare verse 10a in both translations; "Steadfast love and faithfulness meet together" with "Mercy and truth are met together". Both are acceptable translations from the ancient Hebrew, but to me they contain slightly different connotations. Mercy and truth can almost be opposites, and for those two attributes to meet, denotes that the 'hard fact' of truth (i.e. right and wrong) must be tempered with the compassionate act of mercy. What a wonderful thought.

In another example, in some translations the word "Righteousness" is replaced by "Justice". Compare verse 10b versions; "Justice and peace have kissed each other" with "Righteousness and peace have kissed each other". Peace (shalom) implies living a blessed life in communion with God, with nature and with each other. There is no real peace if there is injustice; there is no real peace if unrighteousness (wrong behavior) is being committed.

"Thus says the Lord: Maintain justice, and do what is right, for soon my salvation will come, and my deliverance be revealed." Isaiah 56:1(NRSV)

At 100, she takes her 101 year old blind and deaf and living alone friend to doctor's appointments and grocery shops for her, etc., among others she watches over.

To quote her obituary, she was a retired teacher and when that ended, supported several organizations such as Girl Scouts of America and Lutheran Community Services, with her philanthropy. She was fun, thoughtful, and caring and will be missed by all who knew her.

Our candle lighting will be different in that we will utilize new battery-operated candles. The normal candle lighting ceremony just offers too many opportunities to vary from good social distancing practices. We are confident that the battery-operated candles will prove to be an adequate substitute with wonderful safety advantages!
